An excellent turnout by members, a delicious supper and a toast to the future of the Society, made for a very enjoyable winter's evening.

In her report on the past year, our Chair Maria Kenyon, had some sobering issues for us to reflect upon. Despite the very welcome news of the anonymous donation, for a period of up to 3 years, to keep the Visitor Centres afloat, the future of Castleton Visitor Centre is a long way from being secure. This is where we house our Museum and just as importantly our large archive of documents, photographs and artefacts. It's where we have worked closely with Peak Park staff and volunteers over the last 20 years to provide information and enjoyment for both visitor and residents. The latest news is that the Peak Park has asked consultants to review the "Visitor Experience" across the Park and to report back later in the year. Watch this space!

Other doleful news was the flooding in the Centre, and mainly in the Museum area, that has caused the floor to lift in places. This is an ongoing problem and affects us because access to the Museum is restricted. We are waiting for an update from the Peak Park....

There is, however, some very good news. The temporary display cases arrived and were put to use immediately with the first of 3 new displays (Castleton Hall; The Garland; and the First World War- all with a very local emphasis). We would welcome your ideas for more displays over the coming year.

The video display in the Centre now includes an excellent item on the archaeological digs on the Spital Field as well as early photographs of the village from our archive. The programme of talks is complete for 2024 and will offer something of interest to everyone. Visitors are more than welcome every 3rd Thursday in the Peveril Centre (just not in July when we have an outing, or August or December).

Archaeology on the New Hall site has progressed well as previously reported. All in all a busy, if alarming (!) year for CHS.
